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## REPORT OF THE TRUSTEES FOR THE PERIOD 30 SEPTEMBER 2016 TO 31 JULY 2017

The trustees who are also directors of the charity for the purposes of the Companies Act 2006, present their report with the financial statements of the charity for the period 30 September 2016 to 31 July 2017. The trustees have adopted the provisions of Accounting and Reporting by Charities: Statement of Recommended Practice applicable to charities preparing their accounts in accordance with the Financial Reporting Standard applicable in the UK and Republic of Ireland (FRS 102) (effective 1 January 2015).

## **OBJECTIVES AND ACTIVITIES Objectives and aims**

The objectives of the Charity are:

- To advance the education of young people, in particular but not exclusively, living in impoverished circumstances
- To act as a resource for young people, providing advice and assistance; and organising programmes of physical, educational and other activities as a means of advancing in life; and helping young people by developing their skills, capacities and capabilities to enable them to participate in society as independent, mature and responsible individuals.
- To further such purposes as are recognisable as exclusively charitable under the law of England and Wales.

#### The aims of the Charity are:

- To improve access to good quality education
- To increase retention and attainment
- To create lasting change for disadvantaged young people
- To create opportunities in the workforce for disadvantaged young people
- To equip young people with greater confidence and skills
- To improve the well-being of disadvantaged young people.

## REPORT OF THE TRUSTEES FOR THE PERIOD 30 SEPTEMBER 2016 TO 31 JULY 2017

### **OBJECTIVES AND ACTIVITIES**

#### The focus of our work

INTO Giving partners with other charities to provide and improve education for young people around the world living in difficult circumstances. In the period from 1 November 2016 to 31 July 2017 INTO Giving has supported 12 charitable projects in 8 countries across 5 continents.

INTO Giving maintains a special focus on supporting girls' education in the developing world and refugee education. Our projects were:

### Jusoor School Beirut, Lebanon

INTO Giving, with a £10,000 donation, continued supporting Syrian refugee schoolchildren who have fled to Lebanon to escape their country's civil war. Our 2017 grant paid for psychological counselling across three schools, for more than 1,300 children.

In the previous financial year, INTO Giving paid for the Jusoor's Beirut school to move to a larger premises - and therefore grow the number of schoolchildren taught at the school, from 220 to 350 - and to completely refurbish the new school building and its playground.

### Wulugu Project Northern Region, Ghana

INTO Giving continued to support schoolchildren and teachers at the Wulugu project with £7,100 to repair the Tarabiat Primary School. The school had fallen into such great disrepair, that it was in danger of collapsing. Had the school collapsed, schoolgirls were not only in physical danger, but danger of dropping out of school altogether had the school closed over a period of time for rebuilding.

In the previous financial year, INTO Giving paid for the repair and refurbishment of the teachers' quarters for six teachers, five of whom are women teachers, at Tarabiat's sister school, Bowina Primary. Women teachers in the region face a choice of near uninhabitable accommodation, hours-long commutes (including during the 7-9 month rainy season), or living with local men. Quite naturally, teachers didn't stay, and children, as a result, didn't learn. Providing accommodation in the village where teachers teach embeds teachers in the community, and reduces absenteeism.

#### Sun Child Sponsorship Program Patuakhali, Bangladesh

With a donation of £7,600, INTO Giving continued to support an IT training centre for more than 600 twelve-16-year-old schoolchildren, and a mobile library that reaches 1,400 eight-16-year-olds. Two-thirds of the IT trainees and almost one-half of the children who use the mobile library are girls. All of the schoolchildren come from families whose annual household income is less than £700. In the previous financial year, we funded the supplies for and opening of the IT centre and the mobile library.

## I-CCO (In-Community Care for Orphans) Lusaka, Zambia

In this financial year we have continued to sponsor orphans and vulnerable children at the I-CCO, many of whose parents have died or are suffering from HIV/Aids. The total for this financial year was £1,600.

#### HDF Mercy Centre Preschool Bangkok, Thailand

Over the past year INTO Giving donated £4,578 to the Mercy Centre preschool known locally as the 'Slaughterhouse School', given its proximity to the large slaughterhouse that dominates the Khlong Tooey slum where the preschool operates. INTO Giving's support is allocated toward the school's operating costs, including classroom and teaching supplies, children's meals, and teachers' salaries, and toward costs arisen from a fire that engulfed the local area. INTO Giving has supported pre-schoolchildren and teachers at the Mercy Centre since 2014.

## Colombian Red Cross Bogota, Colombia

In response to the deadly landslides in Mocoa, Colombia, INTO Giving donated £2,542 to provide emergency relief to schoolchildren, their families and other local residents.

#### **United Kingdom and United States**

In 2016/17, INTO Giving continued supporting education projects for disadvantaged children in the United Kingdom and the United States. Each of these projects are local to one or more INTO University Partnership centres.

#### **OBJECTIVES AND ACTIVITIES**

#### The focus of our work

In the UK, the projects were Aim2Attain (Tower Hamlets, London) Caledonian Club (Glasgow), County Community Project (Gloucestershire), Festival of Literature for Young People (Norwich), Step One (Exeter). In the United States we supported Corvallis Public Schools (Oregon).

## Raising awareness

INTO Giving is the charitable offshoot of INTO University Partnerships (IUP), which has more than 1,800 employees and, every year, more than 12,000 students from more than 100 countries across the world. The Charity wants to educate these audiences on the power of philanthropy, how it shapes people - particularly young people - as individuals, and how it shapes communities and global society. We raise awareness of our work and opportunities to engage in philanthropy through presentations at universities, IUP publications (in print and online), the charity's website and through Facebook, Twitter and Instagram. This has resulted in hundreds of young people and IUP staff shaping a better idea of philanthropy, its ease and power, and engaging in activities that help some of the most disadvantaged children have access to and stay in education.

#### **ACHIEVEMENT AND PERFORMANCE**

### **Fundraising activities**

A total of £197,930 was raised by INTO Giving in the financial year ending 31 July 2017 of which £52,600 was matching funds from Andrew Colin, INTO Giving Chairman, and £88,684 was from INTO University Partnerships toward the charity's operating costs.

Events were organised by INTO staff and who gave up their time to plan, set up and run the events, and by INTO students, inside and out of class. All funds raised from these events go direct to the projects and not on INTO Giving operating costs.

INTO Giving appreciates the hard work that has gone into the above fundraising, and would like to thank all those who donated.

### REPORT OF THE TRUSTEES FOR THE PERIOD 30 SEPTEMBER 2016 TO 31 JULY 2017

#### **ACHIEVEMENT AND PERFORMANCE**

#### Fund-raising activities' financial performance

This year we raised £197,930.

£46,319 has been spent on charitable purposes:

- £10,000 to the Jusoor School in Lebanon
- £7,600 toward DCI Sun Child Sponsorship Program in Bangladesh
- £7,100 toward the Wuluqu Project in Northern Region, Ghana
- £4,578 to the Mercy Centre Pre-School in Bangkok
- £2,542 to the Colombian Red Cross
- £2,071 to Corvallis Public Schools in Oregon, USA
- £2,000 to each of County Community Projects in Gloucestershire, Caledonian Club in Glasgow, Aim2Attain in London, Festival of Literature for Young People in Norwich, Step One in Exeter
- £1.600 toward the I-CCO in Lusaka, Zambia:
- £828 for African Adventures in Zanzibar.

We have kept our costs to a minimum as follows:

Fundraising activities and materials:	£1,176
Bank charges:	£157
Travel & subsistence:	£1,197
Admin & subscriptions	£14,752
Total:	£17,282

Total costs, therefore, account for 9% of total funds raised in the year ending 31 July 2017. Of the total costs, £16,001 was paid on behalf of INTO Giving by INTO University Partnerships, and is shown as a donation in these accounts. This resulted in the charity using only £1,281 of its own funds toward operating costs in financial year 2016-17. Within this amount trustees elected to use a portion of the Charity's restricted reserves in 2016/17: £850 was allocated to investigate opening an educational project in Africa. Trustees agreed the funds can be used for this purpose with no specific amount.

## **FINANCIAL REVIEW**

#### **Principal funding sources**

The principal funding sources for the Charity come from fundraising activities carried out by INTO University Partnerships (IUP), IUP students and employees, associated partners and other related third parties. These funds are mostly given in the form of individual donations through sponsoring events, standing orders and donations from international students attending IUP courses. Matching funds are provided by INTO Giving Chairman, Andrew Colin.

The Charity ensures that all monies raised by the staff of IUP, associated partners, families and friends, the general public, companies and grant-making trusts go direct to our projects. Any costs incurred in the running of the Charity are paid for by INTO University Partnerships and Gift Aid collected on the Chairman's matching donations.

#### Reserves policy

INTO Giving maintains reserves to fund suitable projects approved by the board of trustees that are in line with the charity's aims and objectives, and to cover any operating costs not otherwise paid for by INTO University Partnerships. As at 31 July, unrestricted reserves amounting to £124,765, as shown page 9 of these accounts.

## STRUCTURE, GOVERNANCE AND MANAGEMENT

### **Governing document**

The Charity constitutes a Company limited by guarantee. The Directors are appointed and removed in accordance with the terms set out in the Company's Articles of Association. At least three Directors must be appointed at any one time, but there is no maximum to this number. There are currently four Directors appointed to the Company, all of whom are Trustees of the Charity. A Chairperson is decided at each board meeting in the absences of an appointed Chairperson.

### **Trustees**

All INTO Giving Trustees give their time voluntarily and receive no benefit from the Charity. The Trustees bring a wide range and relevant range of experience to the Charity including: three who have worked in education either at secondary or tertiary level; two who have served as school Board of Governors; one who has worked overseas in Africa and four with considerable business experience in the UK and abroad.

## STRUCTURE, GOVERNANCE AND MANAGEMENT

### Risk management

The Trustees have a duty to identify and review the risks to which the charity is exposed and to insure appropriate controls are in place to provide reasonable assurance against fraud and error.

The main risk to which the Charity is subject to is that of ensuring that funds raised by staff of INTO University Partnerships (IUP), their related companies, families and friends, go direct to the charity and that no funds go astray. This is a particular risk when working with partner charities based abroad.

However, INTO Giving Ltd has put in place measures to ensure that, as far as possible, the monies raised are spent on the intended project. This is done by establishing a close relationship with partner Charities who provide a clear set of accounts to INTO Giving showing the exact breakdown of how our donation has been spent. We ask the partner charity to provide regular feedback on the impact of the donation and to be open to INTO Giving staff and supporters who wish to visit the project.

The Trustees have complied with their duty to have due regard to the guidance of the public benefit, published by the Charity Commission, in exercising their powers or duties by monitoring the quality of the provision of services funded by donations made by the Charity.

## REPORT OF THE TRUSTEES FOR THE PERIOD 30 SEPTEMBER 2016 TO 31 JULY 2017

The Trustees review the fundraising activities and the projects they have supported at the end of the year and on a regular basis throughout the year. This review helps us to plan our future projects and fundraising activities and to adjust the plans accordingly. The review also helps us to ensure that we are planning our activities and selecting projects to meet the objectives as set out in the Memorandum of Association.

#### How our activities deliver public benefit

INTO Giving exists to serve the public and ensure that children, young people and others in need benefit from improved access to education and improved quality of education.

Our support for girls' education reduces the risk of girls being excluded from school and further education. To us, girls' education is a case of human and civil rights. Educated girls will marry later, have children later and their children will live longer and are more likely to be educated themselves.

INTO Giving's support for refugees helps ensure that children and young people who have lost their homes and communities continue to learn and, with support from school, rebuild a sense of normality and hope.

We support impoverished children in Bangladesh through access to IT and IT training. In Thailand our support provides classroom and teaching materials at apreschool in Bangkok's largest slum, so to help ensure local children get off to a good start with their education.

In Zambia, INTO Giving donations enable orphans and vulnerable children to continue their education. A portion of the monthly sponsorship money for individuals goes towards the teachers' salaries, providing long-term support for the school.

In underserved communities in the UK and the US we support a range of activities, including: developing employability and life-skills, improved literacy, improving awareness of mental health in schools, and improved confidence and learning that enables young people to enroll in vocational training or university.

#### **Future Plans**

With consideration for our primary donors (INTO students and staff and IUP), INTO Giving intends to switch its financial year, from 30 September - 29 September, to 1 August - 31 July. This will bring us in closer accord with academic years in the UK and the US. As a result, this, the 2016/17 financial year, will run for ten months.

Alongside increased income, INTO Giving aims to continue increasing support for charitable causes. Indeed in the 2017 calendar year, we increased our donations to education projects worldwide by fifty per-cent more than in calendar year 2016.

To meet our commitment to donating larger sums, INTO Giving will, in 2017/18, expand its charitable remit, to support a wide array of humanitarian and community projects, whilst maintaining our commitment to supporting education projects in the developing world and education projects local to IUP centres.

Draft plans for opening an INTO Giving-run education project in an area of educational and economic need remain in place. Development of this project began in financial year 2015/16. INTO Giving will work with IUP and its partner universities to develop this project, providing much needed education and healthcare.

INTO Giving will continue to support our existing family of projects if required and where appropriate. All projects put forward will be put to the Trustees for consideration and selection.

#### 1. ACCOUNTING POLICIES

#### Basis of preparing the financial statements

The financial statements of the charitable company, which is a public benefit entity under FRS 102, have been prepared in accordance with the Charities SORP (FRS 102) 'Accounting and Reporting by Charities: Statement of Recommended Practice applicable to charities preparing their accounts in accordance with the Financial Reporting Standard applicable in the UK and Republic of Ireland (FRS 102) (effective 1 January 2015)', Financial Reporting Standard 102 'The Financial Reporting Standard applicable in the UK and Republic of Ireland' and the Companies Act 2006. The financial statements have been prepared under the historical cost convention.

#### Income

All income is recognised in the Statement of Financial Activities once the charity has entitlement to the funds, it is probable that the income will be received and the amount can be measured reliably.

## **Expenditure**

Liabilities are recognised as expenditure as soon as there is a legal or constructive obligation committing the charity to that expenditure, it is probable that a transfer of economic benefits will be required in settlement and the amount of the obligation can be measured reliably. Expenditure is accounted for on an accruals basis and has been classified under headings that aggregate all cost related to the category. Where costs cannot be directly attributed to particular headings they have been allocated to activities on a basis consistent with the use of resources.

Grants offered subject to conditions which have not been met at the year end date are noted as a commitment but not accrued as expenditure.

#### **Taxation**

The charity is exempt from corporation tax on its charitable activities.

#### **Fund accounting**

Unrestricted funds can be used in accordance with the charitable objectives at the discretion of the trustees.

Restricted funds can only be used for particular restricted purposes within the objects of the charity. Restrictions arise when specified by the donor or when funds are raised for particular restricted purposes.

Further explanation of the nature and purpose of each fund is included in the notes to the financial statements.
